

# **IOWA TRAFFIC CODE** UPDATE: CROSSWALKS

A bill passed (HF 2568) and was signed by the Governor Kim Reynolds during the 2024 legislative to update lowa traffic code related to crosswalks. The legislation will go into effect on July 1st, 2024

#### Prior Law (Section 1. Section 321.1, subsection 51, Code 2024):

Vehicles must yield the right of way to pedestrians.

Pedestrians are defined as "any person afoot".

New Law (Section 1. Section 321.1, subsection 51, Code 2024):

Vehicles must yield the right of way to pedestrians and persons using a pedestrian conveyance.

Pedestrians are defined as "any person afoot".

Pedestrian conveyances are defined as any human-powered device by which a pedestrian may move other than by walking or by which a pedestrian may move another person.

### What are Pedestrian Conveyances?

Including but not limited to:

Wheelchairs	Skateboards
Strollers	Scooters
Bicycles	Electric perso



Electric personal assistive mobility devices

#### Why is this change important?

- 1. Provides legal protections for those using human powered devices (bicycles, wheelchairs, strollers, scooters, etc.)
- 2. Reduces traffic violence
- 3. Enhances road safety for all lowans

# What's the Change?

Drivers must yield right of way to:

- 1. Pedestrians on foot
- 2. Those using any human powered device

## **Effective Date**

July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2024

## Why?

Improve road safety for all people on the road

# **Action Steps**

- 1. Check local road safety ordinances. If your local ordinances are not as protective, realign with the new state law to advocate for improved road safety policies.
- 2. Spread awareness of the new lowa code.

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
